

WHAT IS THE ONE HEALTH CONCEPT?

One Health represents a collaborative, multi-disciplinary approach used to address complex health challenges in an increasingly interconnected and interdependent world. Challenges like disease, food insecurity, poverty and famine are too complex for one discipline, or a single approach or perspective to address or positively effect. The One Health concept recognizes such challenges for what they are, and looks for holistic, multifaceted solutions through collaboration, cooperation and partnership.

ABOUT OHCEA

The One Health Central and Eastern Africa network (OHCEA) is a network of seven public health and seven veterinary Higher Education Institutions¹ that are located in 6 countries in the Eastern and Central African region. These include: Democratic Republic of Congo, Ethiopia,

Kenya, Rwanda, Tanzania and Uganda. OHCEA activities are derived from the overall goal of generating future leaders that have the capacity to address complex health challenges using the One Health Approach. The network's overall aim is to effect positive and sustained change to address complex global health challenges through trans-disciplinary, collaborative 'One Health' approaches.

Universities play a critical role in the education and training of health professionals, leaders, communicators, and educators of tomorrow. In addition to their traditionally conceived 'educational' role (knowledge transfer), universities undertake primary 'research' (generate new knowledge), as well as 'outreach services' (translate or extend knowledge).

OHCEA believes in building strategic and synergistic partnerships. The University of Minnesota and Tufts University are major US partners, who have supported OHCEA in providing technical support for programme implementation.

OHCEA is committed to increasing university-government engagement by strengthening integration of One Health approaches and concepts into curricula and programs in OHCEA institutions, promoting a trans-disciplinary collaborative One Health approach through student experiential learning- including multi-disciplinary joint One Health field attachments and One Health demonstration sites; working with government ministries and personnel to conduct in-service trainings and strengthening the One Health Country Coordinating Committees (CCC) in each of the member countries.

KEY ACHIEVEMENTS

1. Academic and Government Sector Engagement.

Through establishment of One Health Country Coordinating Committees, OHCEA has already provided a key deliverable of connecting the networks' vision and mission to support the mandates and missions of government. Developing pre and in-service training programs in policy and advocacy, and an ongoing focus on leadership skills and competency development, OHCEA is leading change towards a One Health reality!



2. Strengthening and Developing University Curricula and Programs.

The Wildlife health curriculum review has been held in Uganda, Kenya, Ethiopia and Rwanda; the Bachelor Vet Medicine Review has been held in Rwanda Kenya and Uganda and Pre- service curricula development has been held in the six countries.

3. Strengthening student experiential learning.

OHCEA has facilitated student and faculty exchanges between OHCEA schools and US Universities, supported the establishment of One Health Student clubs to increase community engagement and enhanced cross disciplinary coteaching and co-mentoring.



4. Establishment of multi-disciplinary student field attachments and One Health Demonstration sites.

OHCEA has facilitated the development of One Health Demo sites. This innovation has enhanced the One Health approach through innovative cross disciplinary research and community outreach activities. Students from different disciplines have started working together to address common issues affecting their local communities.

5. In-service Training.

OHCEA has supported institutions to carry out One Health Training Needs Assessment (TNA) from which priority areas for training have been derived. Materials are being developed and training will be rolled out to high risk areas in the six OHCEA countries, targeting first responders to disease outbreaks and threats.
